Principal's Address



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Special guests, students, staff, parents and friends of Good Shepherd,

Year 6 students; the Graduating Class of 2022. Tonight is very special for you as you take your step from the comfort and security of Good Shepherd, to something that is new. New experiences, new challenges, new relationships and new learning awaits. The famous American author, Helen Keller, who lost both her sight and hearing at the age of 19 months old said, "Life is either a daring adventure or nothing at all." Be bold, be daring, be courageous, look to the future with confidence and assurance. Know that you are well-prepared and ready to tackle the challenges of secondary school and life beyond. Do not be anxious or doubt your readiness. You are ready for this new and exciting step in your lives. And know that our love and prayers go with you. We have every confidence in you.

Year 6 graduating students; there are so many people who care greatly about you. Special people in your lives – parents, siblings, grandparents and friends. People who love you and support you. Many of them are here tonight to watch you graduate. Do you know that this is a sort of graduation for me too? After all these years I have finally graduated from Primary School. And my mum and daughter are here to see me graduate too.

Why don't you join me in facing our families and friends and saying thank you for all that they have done for us. Let us show how much we appreciate and love them.

It was only a few days ago that one of our staff members, at our daily staff devotion, introduced us to some words attributed to Mother Teresa; words that I had not read before. Now those on staff know well that I find the words of Mother Teresa to be very inspiring and I greatly admire her life of service to others. So this particular devotion really resonated with me. Mother Teresa was writing about what it means to live a "full and complete life". The focus was not on the trappings of financial success, or the glory of prestige, or acknowledgement of some great achievement. No, the focus was on "Joy". "The Joy of Living, The Joy of Loving and The Joy of Serving".

The Joy of Living – to live life to its fullest, taking advantage of all the wonderful skills and talents and opportunities God has blessed us with. To quote Mother Teresa, "Life is an opportunity, benefit from it. Life is beauty, admire it. Life is a dream, realise it." The Joy of Living – what an exciting future you have ahead of you.

The Joy of Loving – to love ourselves as a wonderful creation in God's image; and to love others, with our whole heart, with compassion and with action. To again quote Mother Teresa, "Not all of us can do great things. But we can all do small things with great love."

Of all God's gifts to us, the greatest is love. God's relationship with us is founded on love. And our response is to love others... in what we say and in what we do. The Joy of Loving – let your life be an expression of God's love.

The Joy of Serving – to make a difference in the hearts and lives of others through what we do for them. Again from Mother Teresa, "I alone cannot change the world, but I can cast a stone across the waters to create many ripples."

You have all heard me talk many times about "The Learning That Matters" approach to learning at Good Shepherd. You have all heard me talk about what it is to thrive in

today's world and tomorrow's. Maybe it can be expressed quite simply; "To live joyfully, to love joyfully and to serve joyfully."

Listen to Mother Teresa's beautiful words, "I'm a little pencil in the hand of a writing God, who is sending a love letter to the world".

What a wonderful metaphor for us at Good Shepherd. God's hand holding us tight and using us to write his love into the world.

Dear friends, this Principal's Address is my 26th and last I deliver to you. My life is so much fuller and richer because I have been blessed to work with you and serve you. The Good Shepherd community has been incredibly generous in their acknowledgement of my service as Principal. I have been overwhelmed by your kindness.

Jane and I thank you dearly and will miss you dreadfully. Our years at Good Shepherd, the dear friends that we have made; the amazing colleagues we have worked with, the wonderful children we have taught; you will always be in our hearts. We will miss you.

But life goes on... and what an exciting future you have ahead of you. And so, to finish in Mother Teresa's own words, "Yesterday is gone. Tomorrow has not yet come. We only have today. So let us begin."
